Having the opportunity to study abroad as a Basileus scholar was a very inspiring and valuable experience for me. It helped me to establish new, international contacts at Ghent University - exchange experiences with other scholars dealing with similar topics, and most importantly see myself and my research in the global context that gave me strong confidence to give my best and follow my ideas.

I developed a great relationship with the S:PAM research team and prof. Christel Stalpaert, my supervisor, who became my role model of a strong woman, leading a successful department. Thanks to their warm welcome I was closely involved in all activities of the research center and immersed into the cultural and art scene in Belgium. This experience was very valuable for my future career and personal growth.

'Fairy-tale' Gent is still one of my favorite places – with beautiful architecture, calm but vivid life with many cultural and art events.

In 2007 the European Commission launched the programme 'Erasmus Mundus External Co-operation Window (EM ECW)'. The aim of this programme was to improve the quality of higher education and to promote dialogue and understanding between people and cultures by organizing mobility of students and staff and academic cooperation between EU and certain regions outside of the EU. In 2009 the programme turned into EMA2, Erasmus Mundus Action 2 Partnerships, partnering up under one umbrella with the other Erasmus Mundus funding programme, the Action 1 Joint Master Courses. From 2007 up to 2017 the European Commission funded 308 Erasmus Mundus Partnership projects, involving around 1600 institutions worldwide and granting over 48 000 scholarships for an amount of 951 million EUR¹. With the start of the Erasmus+ programme in 2014 the EMA2 programme ended. The last mobility flows were implemented in 2018.

Ghent University was involved in 35 projects (11% of the total) and coordinated 11 of these. UGent was hence one of the most active European universities in Erasmus Mundus Partnerships. In total 2888 students and staff had the opportunity to study, do research or teach abroad thanks to these projects coordinated (or managed) by UGent. For UGent, there were 733 incoming mobility flows and 83 outgoing. An overview:

In 2016, I received an announcement from the Erasmus Mundus Programme, since our university (UFVJM) was an associated institution. UGent was a partner university, and looking at the physics and solid-state departments, I found the DyNaMat group (Department of Solid State Sciences), which conducts researches in the same area we work, and coincidentally using three techniques that I have used during my graduate studies and further researches. Then, I contacted Prof. Van Waeyenberge, whose kindly accepted to participate in the programme.

About the impact on my institution, our university was created just 13 years ago, and our research facilities are still incipient in the area that I work, Solid State Physics / Material Science. So far, we have done few actions of international collaboration. In this way, the opportunity to establish cooperation with already consolidated research groups, such as the group that welcomed me at UGent, is extremely important for the development of our university, allowing the expansion of activities and their internationalisation. We have been able to discuss several possibilities for joint work. With the support from the group, I was able to learn how to use the open-source software developed by them in a much shorter time than I would have if I had not participated in the mobility. Presently I am using this software in my research projects and have published an article including some results obtained with it.





Without a doubt the EM ECW and EMA2 projects had an impact on UGent. From the start of the new programme of the European Commission UGent was a valuable partner to collaborate with and through the experience in different projects UGent built a strong reputation at partner institutions worldwide which also increased the visibility of the institution.

The projects challenged the internal procedures of UGent and had a positive impact on the procedures at the central administration and at faculty level. It was an interesting learning process and the International Relations Office gained experience and confidence in managing large scale mobility projects outside of Europe and helped several non-EU partners in establishing an IRO.

UGent will sustain the collaborations and relationships with the EMA2 partners worldwide through the regional platforms: CESAM (Central and Latin America), ASEAN+ (Southeast Asia + South Korea, Japan...), China and Africa platform. UGent will of course also stay in touch with all its 733 international alumni of the EM ECW and EMA2 projects.

OTHER TYPES OF COOPERATION:

- UGent as member of the Santander Group takes part in the 'Think Tank for China' and the
 'Think Tank for Latin America' where expertise of collaborating with China/Latin-Amerika
 is shared and gathered.
- Ghent University and Sichuan University created a Summer School in the field of political sciences
- UGent signed an agreement with LPDP (Lembaga Pengelola Dana Pendidikan), a scholarship programme of the Indonesian Government for Indonesian students to study abroad.
- In Brazil several initiatives concerning mobility of students and international collaborations were introduced during and after the Erasmus Mundus Action 2 Programme. In 2011 'Science without borders' was launched in which during 5 years 100.000 Brazilian students received a scholarship to study abroad. Through the contacts of UGent with some Brazilian institutions (several because of EMA2), UGent received a total of 31 students through this programme. In 2017 a new programme 'PrInt' started, mainly focusing on research collaborations.
- TRAIN (Training and Research for Academic Newcomers) was a project coordinated by UGent and funded by the King Baudouin Foundation. It was about developing, implementing and evaluating a professional development training at 4 universities in the Western Balkans: University of Belgrade, University of Novi Sad, University of Montenegro and the University of Sarajevo.
