Context?

Strategic Institutional Partnership (SIP) between UGent and The University of Queensland (UQ)

SIPS focus on the university-wide cooperation with one or more preferential partners around the globe.

UGent develops SIPs with University of Toronto, Harvard, California & Queensland.



A strategic partnership is 'a formal alliance between two or more higher education institutions developed through an international process whereby the partners share resources and leverage complementary strengths to achieve defined common objectives.



Strategic cooperation is tied to the **strategic goals and objectives** of an academic unit, college or university as a whole.



It indicates a multi-dimensional engagement between the involved institutions and implies the joint undertaking of a **diverse range of activities** with the aim of the parties' mutual benefit' (Kuder, 2016).

The <u>SIP activities</u> include but are not limited to:


- Joint research collaborations, or the joint publication of scientific papers and educational materials
